

Catch One.

Waxworms

I remember tying some of my first flies (now over 20 years ago!) Like most budding fly fisherman, I knew very little about the flies I was using and almost nothing about the aquatic insects they were supposed to imitate. At that time I was pretty proficient drifting bait for trout. Wax worms always worked really well for me so naturally some of my first flies were crude imitations made of yarn covered in strips of latex glove. I was matching the hatch....kinda.

20 years have passed and I have learned very much about the flies I use and the macroinvertebrates I'm imitating. Some reading, mentoring, and especially a few high school biology classes really straightened that out. In the years since my yarn and latex creations I have run across other "wax worm flies" and have heard more than once people say they thought the fish were taking a fly for a wax worm. A little research will tell you this is very unlikely. Wax worms are the larval stage of the greater wax moth. These moths are parasites that lay their eggs in beehives. The hatched larvae feed on honey until they spin a silk cocoon, transform into pupae, and then emerge into adult moths. So if wax worms are never present in a trout stream and trout don't know what they are, why do they work so well for bait.

A little more research of the macroinvertebrates found in trout streams will show you that tan caddis fly larvae and crane fly larvae are common food items in a trout's diet. If you compare an image of a wax worm side by side to a tan caddis or crane fly larvae, you might say the wax worm is a reasonable facsimile. So are the trout eating the wax worms because they think they are caddis or crane flies? That sounds good, but that's the thing about fishing. We can research, study, and analyze all we want, but until we learn to talk to the fish, we're just guessing. It's fun to think though about the possibility that any of us who have thrown wax worms early in our careers as trout fisherman were matching a hatch that we didn't even know existed. The moral to this story is to get you thinking about the bait or flies you are using and why they are (or aren't) working. Pick up your kids biology book or pick up some rocks on your next trip to the stream. The more

you learn about the feeding habits of the fish the better fisherman or fisherwoman you will become, whether you're using bait or flies.

We've determined that the wax worms work, so lets talk about some flies. The larvae we are talking about are very easy to imitate. Dubbing a robust body of tan dubbing on a size 14-10 straight or curved shank hook and ribbing with thread or wire and your good to go. My personal go-to caddis pattern I call the Forever Caddis uses a black 5/32" brass bead on a Tiemco #12 2457 scud hook. For the body I use UV tan Ice Dub and I rib the body with the tying thread which is 6/0 tan Uni-Thread. This fly has a dark head and tan, semi-translucent body just like the natural. Aside from some extra techniques I use to make this fly bullet proof, this pattern is so easy it can be tied by a three year old (I've witnessed my daughter Jocelyn do it!) For my crane fly imitation (or water-worm as they're sometimes known) I use a pattern I call the Wacky Crane Fly that only uses 3 materials. A Tiemco #12 2457 scud hook, tan 6/0 Uni-Thread, and tan Lion Brand Thick and Quick Chenille. Some species of crane flies grow slightly larger than wax worm size and typically curl into a wheel shape when they are dislodged from the stream bottom and rolling in the current. For this fly the chenille is fastened in the center of the hook shank. A furled or twisted section is then formed extending from both sides of the hook shank "wacky worm" style. This technique is much easier explained in person! The head is then darkened with black Sharpie. The resulting fly looks like a crane fly impaled through it's midsection. This allows the body to move freely in the current and assume the rolling wheel position during the drift. The only down side to this pattern is that Lion Brand discontinued this chenille and I have only one skein left. I'm currently looking for a substitute material so feel free to experiment!

Now all you have to do is take some time to tie some of these simple patterns and give them a try, knowing with confidence what they are and what they're imitating. Remember to keep learning and you'll catch more fish. Good luck and don't forget to take a kid fishing so they too can learn to love and protect our coldwater resources!

I first met the older fisherman along the creek one day I don't know how long ago. I had just gotten to the Schoolhouse hole and was ready to take a break. There was an older gentleman seated on the bench, and we said "Hello" as I sat down. I asked how he had done in the manner of those who pass on the stream. He said that he had had a good morning landing over twenty fish. Naturally I inquired as to what flies he had been using. He told me good mannerly, but I don't remember any more. We talked a while longer until I was ready to leave. I wished him good luck and went up the path, leaving him room to fish. That was my introduction to John "Pap" Kennedy.

After that I would encounter him from time to time. Anytime there was a stocking or a cleanup on the creek, there was John. I learned that everyone knew this lanky man from his many years on the creek. Everyone called him "Pap." As the years went by, I recognized how respected John was among the local fishing community. John Kennedy was the dean of Yellow Creek. As the years passed, John became older and more frail. Eventually cancer took one of his legs. Yet John would still fish at the dam from his wheel-chair, and he still caught large trout. At coalition meetings, John would still be there to offer advice. There never was a better steward of the water. The Blair County Chapter of Trout Unlimited

changed its name to The John Kennedy/Blair County Chapter in John's honor. John served as Southwest

Vice-President of the PA Council of Trout Unlimited for several years and did a fine job. He was the embodiment of what a TU member should be.

John Kennedy passed away in early February at the age of eighty-eight. We will all miss him. Tight Lines, John, wherever you are fishing now.

News from the PFBC

At its January 2015 PA Fish and Boat Commission quarterly meeting, the Board of Commissioners approved proposed rule-making that could make significant changes to the Commission's Delayed Harvest Artificial Lure Only (DHALO) areas. The proposed changes are as follows:

- 1. Move the start of the trout harvest period from June 15th to the Saturday before Memorial Day.
- 2. Change the minimum size length limit of trout from 9 inches to 7 inches.
- 3. Allow the use of bait by all anglers during the trout Harvest Period.
- 4. Allow youth anglers under the age of 16 to use bait year round in DHALO areas.

The Commissioners will consider these proposals, most likely in July. The Commissioners could act on all, some, or none of the proposed changes.
