

Ah winter! I like to fish in the winter. Although the weather is not always the best, fewer anglers provide a nice compensation. Solitude is wonderful.

I hope everyone had a very happy holiday season. I would like to thank all of you who helped make this past year a good one for the chapter. We carried a full slate of projects throughout the year so a person did not have to look very hard to find something of interest to get involved. This year will be no different. Many of our projects have already begun. In the early part of the year you can help with our free fly tying courses held in January and February. Any student in the fly tying courses will also have an opportunity to receive a ten dollar rebate on a new membership to TU. Our most important project is the spring fundraising banquet. This year's event occurs on March 21, 2015 at the Holiday Inn in downtown Johnstown. We always welcome volunteers to our banquet committee, which has been working since October.

The Trout in the Classroom schools got their shipments of eggs in November. Classroom programs will occur in the early months of this year and will conclude with release day programs in April and May of 2015. Anyone interested in helping children to understand cold-water conservation as well as fishing is welcome to help.

The Cold-Water Conservation Corp. is an ongoing project for the entire year. It involves water monitoring of local streams throughout the year. The program will be expanded this year to include identification of aquatic life in local streams. Currently we have only two or three volunteers involved with this work: therefore, there is always a need for more volunteers.

In late spring and summer there is a break to do some fishing, but midsummer will find us back at it again with projects on Bens Creek, Potter Creek, and Yellow Creek. Want more? In April and May there are cleanups on Yellow Creek, Shade Creek, and Little Paint Creek.

Before I close, let me add one more thing. You can do all of this and still look good while wearing a brand new tee shirt or fishing shirt featuring the Mountain Laurel name and the TU logo. See the flyer in this newsletter to order one or more.

Trout in the Classroom – A Valuable Program

School students participating in PA TROUTS "Trout in the Classroom" became the proud parents of over 150 viable brook trout eggs around Election day. The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, in partnership with the PA Council of Trout Unlimited, chose Brook Trout, Pennsylvania's state fish. "They are the only trout native to Pennsylvania (Technically a char – Ed.), they spawn in the fall, and since they act as the proverbial "Canary in the Coal Mine," their presence or lack thereof provides lots of opportunities to educate youth about cold-water ecosystems." Throughout the year students will be studying and caring for these trout, and teachers will be connecting numerous lessons to the program. In the spring students will release the surviving trout into a state-approved body of water. Remember, it's not about the number of trout released, it's about the experience. Many students will then participate in a related field trip. Volunteers are always needed to help with these field trips. State Council News and Notes

Chapter member Jeff Ripple, who is the Environmental Chairperson for PA Trout, Reported that the state legislature has passed a new law allowing development right down to the stream bank on many of our most precious watersheds. Thus there will be no riparian buffers to prevent siltation and pollution of those watersheds. For more information contact Jeff at 814-701-9703.

Jeff Ripple wants to remind chapter members that it is important to contact their federal legislators and ask them to support the clean water act, and in particular, the regulations which apply to intermittent and ephemeral waters. These waters are important to larger rivers and streams and help to support fish life such as wild brook trout. Their loss could also have an adverse effect on drinking water supplies. Make your feelings known to your legislators now!

PFBC News

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission Board of Commissioners, at their January 21, 22, 2015 quarterly meeting in Harrisburg, will recommend to the Executive Director the continuation or elimination of stocking of hatchery trout in ten segments of streams that have been confirmed to contain Class A wild trout populations. Class A populations are deemed sufficient to create a viable recreational fishery and are a natural resource conservation success story. However, these stream segments have been historically supplemented with hatchery trout in the past.

The policy of the PFBC is not to stock hatchery trout in designated Class A waters. This policy can be found in two PFBC Bureau of Fisheries Guidance documents.

However, this is a governance policy set by the Board of Commissioners and external and other influences can be taken into consideration to make exceptions or changes to the written policy by the Board of Commissioners.

Any changes or lack of changes in regard to stocking will not add or delete or alter any tackle regulations on any of the waters.

The action taken will set the precedent for any future waters that may someday fall into this category.

The stream segments are:

Fishing Creek - Clinton County 2.4 miles

Little Lehigh Creek - Lehigh County, two sections 7.9 miles and 3.3 miles

Martins Creek - Northhampton County, 7.6 miles

Monocacy Creek – Lehigh/Northampton Counties, 3.4 miles

Penns Creek – Centre County, 13.1 miles

Pohopoco Creek – Carbon County, 3.0 miles

Yellow Creek – Bedford County, two sections 2.7 miles, 1.5 miles Fly Fishing Only Section

Public input is being sought regarding if all or some of the ten segments of water should or should not continue to be stocked.
